

What you'll need!

- · Cornmeal, for the baking sheet
- Flour, for shaping
- 1 pound(s) pizza dough, thawed, if frozen
- 3/4 cup(s) part-skim ricotta cheese
- 2 clove(s) garlic, finely chopped
- 1/4 cup(s) grated Parmesan
- Kosher salt and pepper
- 1/2 cup(s) chopped fresh flat-leaf parsley
- 1/2 cup(s) chopped fresh basil leaves
- 3 ounce(s) part-skim mozzarella, grated
- 3/4 cup(s) marinara sauce

Directions

- 1. Heat oven to 425 degrees F. Dust a baking sheet with commeal. On a lightly floured surface, shape the dough into a 14- to 16-inch oval, circle, or rectangle and place on the prepared baking sheet.
- In a medium bowl, combine the ricotta, garlic, Parmesan, and 1/2 teaspoon each salt and pepper. Fold in the parsley, basil, and 1/4 cup mozzarella. Spread the sauce over the dough and dollop the ricotta mixture over the top.
- 3. Sprinkle with remaining 1/2 cup mozzarella and bake until the crust is golden brown and crisp, 20 to 25 minutes.

We all like to be consulted about the work we do. We have our own ideas about it ought to be done, and how it ought to be organized. And when we have personally helped create a new method, or suggested a new idea, we are much more interested in giving it a fair try than we would be if it were somebody else's brainstorm

People like a chance to say what they think. They like to get credit for having good ideas. This is a fact every boss can apply to advantage with every individual who works on his or her team.

Many bosses are so eager for credit they can't bear to share it with anyone else. If a subordinate comes us with a good idea, all they can think about of is they wish they had thought of it first. They really don't enjoy it a bit.

What do you do, for example when you think of a better way for one of your employees to handle part of his or her job? Most of us just call in the employee, explain the idea, and tell him to try it. That's quick and easy. But then it's your idea, not his and he doesn't have any personal stake in making it work. In fact, if it does work, he may look a bit stupid for not having thought of it himself.

What if, instead of presenting your ready-made answer, you discussed the problem with the employee first. If he doesn't come up with your answer, or a better one, ask him to give it some thought. Sometime later, bring it up again and see if he has any new ideas. Ask questions, if you can, that might lead him in the direction you want him to go, but don't be obvious.

Before long he may come up with the idea you want, or close enough to it so you can suggest your idea. But don't present it as your idea. Present it as something that his suggestions brought to mind, and give him credit for doing so.

The plain, proven fact is that people carry out their own suggestions or suggestions they've had a part in developing much more enthusiastically than suggestions that are thrust upon them from the outside. Even if you're so brilliant that you never need any one else's suggestions, do your best to disguise the fact. It takes more than good ideas to make a top-notch organization run. It also requires cooperation and sharing credit.
